#### DEATH OF MISS E. CAWS

The death at her residence, The Elms, Seaview, on Thursday, of Miss Emmeline Caws removes a highly respected and beloved resident. Miss Caws was the daughter of the late Capt. John G. Caws, one of the trustees of Beulah Chapel. The deceased, who was 58 years of age, had been ailing for a considerable period, but was out walking recently. She is survived by a younger sister, Miss Cecile Caws, to whom the sympathy of the community has been extended. Their father was captain of the late Earl Crawford's mammoth yacht the Valhalla. He died in 1922. Since the death of Mr. Frank Watson, C.C., the deceased had been acting superintendent of Beulah Sunday School. She was a very active member of the chapel, and in that connection was a staunch worker for the Girls' Own. Her interest was also devoted to other local societies, including the Nursing Association and the Women's Institute, of which she was a member. Miss Caws worked hard for the welfare of the Zenana Bible and Medical Mission, being a committee member of the local branch since its formation about 20 years ago. In addition she was a member of the Seaview Choral Society. Several years ago Miss Caws was awarded a diploma for 25 years service as a teacher in the Beulah Sunday School.

The funeral took place at the St. Helena Parish Church on Tuesday, the Rev. Evan C. Morgan (Vicar of Seaview) officiating. The service was of a simple nature. The remains were interred in a bricked grave lined with evergreens and flowers.
