

LATE CAPT. CAWS.

Last Tribute to Well-Known Pilot.

CREMATORIUM CEREMONY.

A large and representative body of shipping officials attended at South Stoneham yesterday afternoon, when the remains of Captain William Byron Caws, a popular member of the Trinity House Isle of Wight Inward Pilots' Association, were cremated. Later the remains were scattered on the lawn in the Remembrance.

Captain Caws, who had completed over 30 years' service, was choice pilot for the United States Lines and Red Star Line. He died on Monday after a brief illness.

PILOT'S FUNERAL.—In the presence of a large number of his colleagues in the Pilot Service, the remains of the late Captain W. B. Caws, son of Mr. H. J. Caws, of Seaview, a well known and highly popular member of the Trinity House I.W. Inward Pilots Service, who died at his Southampton home last week, were cremated at South Stoneham Crematorium on Thursday week. The remains were scattered in the Garden of Remembrance after the committal lines had been pronounced by the Rev. W. Froud, of the Liberal Catholic Church, Wimborne. DEATH OF MR. W. B. CAWS.

We regret to record the death of Mr. William Byron Caws, a Trinity Pilot, which occurred on Sunday at "Staple-grove," Hlenheim Avenue, Southampton. Mr. Caws, who was 54 years of age had recently recovered from a serious illness and had resumed his professional duties but was again taken ill. A member of an old Seaview family Mr. Caws removed to Southampton some years ago.

Mr. Caws was a member of the St. Helens Council at the outbreak of the Great War, but resigned his seat owing to the exigencies of the Pilot Service. On his retirement the present Chairman of the Council (Mr. T. P. Sheath) was elected. Mr. Caws was pilot to the United States Line, and was for many years Secretary of the Inward Pilots Association. He was serving as a sub-commissioner at Trinity House at the time of his death. He was a member of the China Lodge of Freemasons. He leaves a widow, three sons and three daughters, with whom the deepest sympathy is felt, and also with his sister at Seaview and brother, Mr. Percy A. Caws, of St. Helens.
